

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# Letter from the Team

Start:Empowerment was brought into existence in the fall of 2019 when we realized that much student knowledge around the environment and ensuing climate crisis consisted of basic topics like recycling, polar bears and melting ice caps. Existing climate education programs failed to incorporate a social-political-economical analysis of environmental issues, BIPOC knowledge and sustainable practices, and the voices of on-the-ground Environmental Justice groups that are actively fighting against pollution in their communities.

Thus, Start:Empowerment established itself as a 501c3 nonprofit *intentionally* situated at the nexus of climate education and environmental justice organizing.

For us, it was critical to emphasize and integrate justice frameworks used by and within movements into school curricula to meet youth where they spend the majority of their time and allow for teachers to easily teach these concepts within their subjects. We also also pride ourselves in providing accessible community-based education.

Both operating dually in NYC and TX, as well as led by people of color aiming to serve frontline communities, we remain committed to not only providing quality in-school social-environmental justice education, but also skills-based training and grassroots organizing support in an effort to bridge education and action.





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

Our goal is to contribute to building, strengthening, and connecting popular movements in New York City and beyond.





# Summer School Series

In the summer of 2022, we co-hosted Summer School: Redefining Justice in the Climate Movement, a six-week, twice weekly foundational course curated by BIPOC organizers from S:E and Sustainable Brooklyn.

In addition raising the political consciousness of attendees, we cocreated 6 unique webinars and workshops each with 17 Summer School educators (the speakers).

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
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



Start:Empowerment collaborated with WE ACT for Environmental Justice, one of the first EJ groups in New York, to co-host their Environmental Health and Justice Leadership Training virtually. As a result:

- We helped conduct 4 modules on climate change and climate justice, food justice, toxic chemicals in household products, and equitable transportation and air quality.
- Over 50 youth between the ages of 15-25 broadened their knowledge of climate justice and environmental health and received practical skills training to organize campaigns or projects in the environmental justice movement.
- Over 20 youth and organizers shared their community projects and experiences within the environmental and climate justice movements at the virtual EXPO.
- Reached over 300 individuals through our digital media.











The goal of our community organizing is to assist frontline and grassroots groups by supporting the capacity-building, strategic planning, back-end operations, internal culture shifting, and resolution practice so that groups can focus on what they do best-fight for the people.

This also helps us strengthen movements and provide avenues for our program learners to plug in, ultimately, bridging education and action.



# **Empowering Youth** 4

The goal of our Environmental Justice (EJ) Youth Vanguard program is to provide 16-24 year olds who are already active in organizing spaces or have a demonstrated interest in climate/ecological/environmental issues with funding, mentorship, and skills-training on pressing community EJ issues.

This helps strengthen the future of the EJ movement by fortifying organizers' political consciousness, fostering cohort relationships for increased cross-movement ties, and teaching applicable systems-change frameworks that reduce harms and center healing.


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
